Grandma, if we all shared our food would there be enough for everyone in the world?" asked David


"I'm sure there would be," replied Grandma. God has provided enough food for the whole world. Come on now, we need to finish our work before the sun gets too hot."

Grandma asked the children if they would like to give their Mum a gift of flowers. They thought that this was a good idea.


Mum was very happy with her gift.

And Sarah, you have done very well too! It is hard to milk a goat. You have both been very patient.


I'll take this milk to Grandma while you have a run with Jess."

"I know," cried David, "I can hear the birds sing. I can hear the wind in the trees."




"And I can hear a little noise in the grass," said Sarah. "Do you think it is a mouse?"

"Isn't God clever?" said Grandma. "I'm sure if I was blind, I would still know what kind of food I was eating.


Mangoes, bananas, oranges, meat and rice...they all taste different! They feel different too!"

"We thank you Lord for our family and most of all for His love and good gifts to us."







"David, let's find things that God has made. I see a sea star. What can you find?" said Sarah.


"I see rocks. I see seaweed on the rocks. Some seaweed is green. Some is brown and some is red," said David.

"That's a hermit crab," said Mum. Hermit crabs look for an old shell to use for their home.







So they took off their shoes and crept over the rocks into the cold water.


"Look at this little water fly," called David. "It can skate on water! It has a pattern on its back too. I would like to know how it skates."

Then Sarah found a beetle.


"Come and look at this pattern," she called. It's on a beetle. It has black spots on its red back."
