Jesus went into the room where the little girl lay dead. He took her by the hand and said, "Little girl, I say to you, get up."

The girl sat up straight away. She was alive! Jesus said, "Give her something to eat."

It was a miracle! Jairus had seen Jesus make his dead daughter come alive again! Only Jesus could do such a miracle!

The Lord is my shepherd Psalm 23

Do you know what a shepherd does? A shepherd looks after sheep.

In the land of Israel, in Bible times, shepherds didn't stay in one place. They took there sheep here and there, looking for the best grass, shade from the sun, and cool water for them to drink. The shepherd also kept the sheep from danger. If wild animals come, the shepherd would use his special shepherd's crook, or staff, to chase the animals away. If a sheep got caught in a prickle bush, or went into a cave, the shepherd would get him out. A shepherd loves his sheep.

There is a song written in the Bible, called "The Lord is my shepherd". That means that God looks after us just like a shepherd. He provides us with food and water. He also keeps us from danger, just as the shepherd keeps his sheep from danger. Jesus loves us too, just as the shepherd loves his sheep. (*The children could repeat this after you, line by line.*)

The Lord is my shepherd.

He gives me everything I need.

He leads me to where the grass is green.

He leads me to cool water.

He helps me when I am sad.

He helps me to do what is right.

Even when I am in danger, I will not be afraid

Because He is with me.

Just as the shepherd uses his staff to protect the sheep,

The Lord protects me and makes me feel brave.

He gives me joy.

I am glad that His goodness will be with me all of my life.

And I will be with Him forever.

Jesus as a boy

Jesus grew up in the town of Nazareth, in the land of Israel. His father Joseph was a carpenter. That meant he made things from wood. Joseph taught Jesus how to make things with wood. Mary, His mother, took care of Him. She taught Him how to help at home, about the plants and animals, and she told Him about heaven and about God.

As Jesus grew up, He learned to read and write. In his free time, He walked with his brothers and sisters through the streets of Nazareth and in the fields, where He learned about people and about God's creation.

He saw the shepherds go into the fields with their flocks and watched the good shepherds who loved and cared for their sheep. He watched the people who worked at growing grapes. He saw them trim the vines that would grow the fruit.

When Jesus was growing up, the people of Nazareth did not know that Jesus was the Son of God. They only knew that He was "Jesus, the son of Joseph, the son of the carpenter." They did not know that God in heaven was His real father.

The Baby Moses Exodus 1 & 2

There was a new king over the land of Israel. He was an Egyptian king called a pharaoh, but was not a good king, like the king in the days of Joseph. He was mean, and made the people of Israel do very hard work, with no rest. He did not even want them to have boy babies. The people of Israel were afraid of the mean king.

A lady had a baby boy and wanted to hide him from the king. She had a daughter called Miriam.

"Miriam, we will have to hide our baby," said the mother.

"Why, Mummy?" Miriam asked.

"The king says he will kill every baby boy who is an Israelite," the mother answered. "We live in Egypt now, but our fathers and grandfathers came from Israel many years ago."

"Come now and help me hide our lovely baby. We must save him from the angry king. God said I must hide him."

They gathered long grasses, called reeds, that grew beside the river and wove a strong basket. They floated it on the river among the reeds. It was so thick that the water could not get in the basket. Mother put the baby in the basket and hid it among the reeds.

"Miriam, please stay here and watch over our baby," said the mother. Miriam stayed nearby and looked after her baby brother.

One day the daughter of the king came to swim in the river. She found the basket with the baby in it.

"Come and see!" she called to her maids. "There's a little baby in the basket. I want to take him home and have him for my own. I'll call him Moses."

The burning bush Exodus 3 & 4

When he went closer to see the bush, God called him.

So God said, "Throw down the stick you are holding."

Moses threw it down. It turned into a snake.

So Moses went back to Egypt. He told the people that God would take them out of Egypt. He would lead them to a new land.

Let my people go Exodus 5 – 15

"No! They are my best workers," Pharaoh said. "I will not let them go."

So God sent frogs, and mosquitoes and flies and grasshoppers to Egypt to make King Pharaoh change his mind. He also sent a hail storm.

Pharaoh said, "I had better let those people go," he said, "then all these horrible things might stop happening to me."

But he changed his mind and wouldn't let the people go.

God told Moses that He would send a sickness, and the oldest boy in every family would die, but not the Israelite boys. He told the Israelites to kill a lamb, and put the blood above their doors. When they did this, the sickness would pass over their house. And it did. No Israelite boys died.

But Pharaoh's son died. He said, "This is enough. "I will let the people go."

The Israelites were ready. They had packed up all their things. They started moving towards the Red Sea.

A long journey to a new land Exodus 16 & 17

Wherever the cloud stopped, the people stopped and set up their tents, until the cloud moved again.

God was with them, every night, in a tall pillar of fire. God kept them safe.

Sometimes the cloud would stop for a long time. Then the cloud would move.

"Follow the cloud," someone would shout.

Everyone would hurry about, packing up their beds and pulling down their tents. It was a busy time.

But God's presence, in the cloud, only moved as fast as the old people and the little children could walk.

There was no food in the desert, but God provided food. God sent little birds called quail, they could catch and cook to eat. God also sent sweet bread called manna. They would find it on the ground each morning.

Moses knew that God was always with them and would take them safely, to their new land.

The Ten Commandments Exodus 19 - 20

The people of Israel were traveling in the desert. They reached a place called Mount Sanai.

Moses climbed up the mountain to talk to God, carrying two big, flat stones, while all the people waited at the bottom of the mountain.

God wrote His rules on the stones. God's rules tell people that God is the only real God to love and trust and how to do what is good and right, to other people.

God gave Moses the rules so that they would know what is the right thing to do and how to live good lives."

God's rules are called the Ten Commandments. Here are the rules He gave to Moses, and to all people who follow Him.

- 1. No other gods
- 2. No idols
- 3. No swearing
- 4. Keep one day especially for God.
- 5. Honour your mother and father.
- 6. Do not kill.
- 7. Love the person you marry and do not take someone else's wife.
- 8. Do not steal.
- 9. Do not lie.

10. Do not be jealous of things other people have. Do not want their things for yourself.

The Good Shepherd John 10

A shepherd takes care of sheep. The sheep know the shepherd's voice, and they follow where he leads them. The shepherd does not follow behind the sheep, but walks in front of them to show them where to go. The shepherd leads his sheep to find good grass to eat and water to drink.

At night he leads them back to the sheepfold, which has a big wall or fence all around it. The sheep are safe inside the sheepfold, safe from wild animals and thieves. The shepherd stays guard at the entrance to the sheepfold and protects his sheep. The shepherd counts his sheep to make sure that not one is lost.

Each sheep is important to the shepherd. All shepherds care about and protect their sheep. Jesus told us that He is the Good Shepherd, the one who takes care of the sheep. Can anyone guess who the sheep are?

That's right, we are the sheep. Of course, we are not really sheep, but sometimes we can be like sheep.

Sheep don't think about whether there might be danger ahead. They just follow other sheep. This means that sheep will even follow other sheep right over the edge of a cliff! Jesus wants us to follow Him, and not just do what others do, without thinking.

Sheep sometimes go the wrong way and get lost. Yes, people can do that too. People can go away from Jesus. But Jesus, the Good Shepherd will forgive us if we go the wrong way and take us back into His family.

Sheep are not good at protecting themselves. If a wolf comes, they cannot fight the wolf. They are not even fast enough to run away from it. But the Shepherd fights the wolf and keeps it away from the sheep. Jesus, our Good Shepherd keeps our enemy Satan away from us too, when we follow Him.

God wants us to make the wisest choice. That is, to listen to the Good Shepherd, Jesus, and to follow Him.

A lady called Hannah was very sad, because she had no baby. She went to the temple to pray. Eli was God's servant at the temple. He told people about God. Eli prayed for Hannah, that God would give her a baby. God was good to her. She had a baby boy the next year.

Peter looked at the man. He took the man's right hand and lifted him to his feet.

"In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, get up and walk."

Then God sent an angel to tell Phillip "Go this way into the desert. God has something for you to do." Phillip listened and obeyed.

He wondered why God had sent him to such a lonely place, but he knew that God's Spirit was with him. God wanted Phillip to tell someone about Jesus.

Soon a very important man, from the country of Ethiopia in Africa, came past in his chariot. He was in charge of the Queen of Ethiopia's treasure and he was reading the words of Isaiah, from the Bible.

Phillip asked the man if he understood the words he was reading. "I can't understand them," he answered, "and I have no one to teach me."

So Phillip explained to the man from Ethiopia how God had written long ago about his Son and that anyone who believes in Jesus could become a child of God. To show that they really believed, they could be baptized. That meant going into some water as a sign that Jesus has made them clean inside.

He went to the marketplace every day and talked to people about Jesus.

Some men saw him talking to the people and asked who Paul was. They heard him speaking about things they had never heard before. They took Paul to Mars Hill, to a place where he could speak to many people at once. The hill is in the middle of the city, so it was easy for people to see and hear him.

Paul stood at the top of the hill and told them "People of Athens, I see that you have lots of gods. I even found one that said 'To the Unknown God'. I am going to tell you about the One that you are worshipping that you do not know."

Paul told them about how God created the world and that He doesn't like anyone to worship stone or gold or silver statues. He told them that Jesus, God's son, was killed but came alive again. Some people made fun of Paul but other people said that "We will listen to Paul again about this."

Not everyone will want to hear about Jesus when you tell them. Some might make fun of you, but then others will want to hear more. We need to learn what the Bible says, so we can answer their questions.

Three men in a fiery furnace Daniel 3

Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego were three men who loved God. They knew that bowing to idols was wrong, but it was dangerous to disobey a king!

King Nebuchadnezzar was a very bossy king. "Everyone must bow down and pray to a big gold statue I have made. It will be your god," said the king.

Three men would NOT bow to the big gold statue. "We bow and pray ONLY to God," they said, "We do not bow to a statue that a man has made."

The king was VERY angry. He made another rule. "Throw them into a VERY hot fire," he said. "That will make them change their mind."

The soldiers made a VERY hot fire. The three men prayed and they asked God to help them. They would not bow down to statues.

The king's soldiers threw the men into the fire. It was very hot but it didn't burn them! God was looking after them! Not even their clothes got burnt!

The King looked into the fire and saw God's angel looking after the men. He knew a statue could never do that. Then the King believed in the true God.

The King made a new rule.

"The three men were right and I was wrong. Everyone in my kingdom must pray to the true God and not to statues," he said.

The golden calf Exodus 32

God wrote His rules on the stones. God's rules tell people that God is the only real God to love and trust and how to do what is good and right, to other people.

"Let's make a God we can see, out of gold treasure," they said. They melted their gold treasure in a hot fire and made it into the shape of a calf. They danced around the calf and prayed to it. But the golden calf could not answer their prayers.

As Moses came down the mountain, he saw the people praying to their idol. He was so angry that he broke the stones that God had written on. Then everyone remembered how God had saved them from the Egyptian Pharaoh King, and they were sorry.

Moses went back up the mountain again, with two new stones. God gave Moses the new rules again. "Tell the people to follow these good rules," God said.

"Now they will know what is the right thing to do and how to live good lives."

God's rules are called the Ten Commandments. If we live the way God wants us to, He will protect us.

Daniel and the king's dream Daniel 6

Daniel was a friend of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, who God saved from the fiery furnace. God blessed Daniel and made him very wise.

King Darius liked Daniel, and allowed him to help rule the land. Now the other wise men were jealous. They tried to find something bad about Daniel. But Daniel was a good man. He always prayed to God. The men could not find anything bad about him. So they made a plan.

They went to the king and said, "Let's make a new law. Let's say that everyone has to bow down and pray to you. If they don't, we'll throw them into the lion's den."

The king liked the idea of being so important. He liked the idea of people bowing down to him. So he made it a new law.

Daniel heard about the new law. But he went into his room and prayed near the open window. The men saw him through the window and took him to the king.

Let's throw Daniel into the lions' den," they said.

The king was sorry, because he liked Daniel very much. But he had made the law and it could not be changed. The men's plan had worked. They put Daniel in the lions' den.

The next morning, the king got up very early. He ran to the lions' den. "Daniel, are you there?" called the king.

"Yes," called Daniel. "I am here and I am not hurt. God sent an angel to close the lions' mouths."

Saul escapes in a basket Acts 9:19-31

Remember the story of Saul, who used to kill Christians? (Saul's name was later changed to Paul.) One day Jesus came to him when he was on the road. Jesus came as a bright light, and He spoke to Saul and said that he had to stop killing Christians. Saul knew it was Jesus, and became a follower.

Now Saul believed that Jesus was sent by Father God and he wanted to tell others about Jesus too. His old 'friends' (who didn't love Jesus) still wanted to stop the Christians and now they were angry with Saul too and wanted to stop him!

The city of Damascus, like most cities in those days was built with the houses and other buildings inside a big tall wall which went all around for protection. There were gates and windows in the wall, but anyone going in or out had to go through the gates in the wall. So, Saul would have been seen if he just ran or walked out of Damascus in the daytime. God gave some of his friends a very clever idea. They found a big basket and tied a strong rope to it.

At night, when no one was looking, Saul got in the basket, and the friends lowered it down over the wall, so no one knew he had escaped. God protected him, and Saul continued to tell many people about Jesus.

Paul and Silas in jail Acts 16:16-40 (revision)

Paul had a good friend named Silas. Paul and Silas went from town to town telling everyone the good news about Jesus Christ the son of God.

It was the rule that no one could talk about Jesus, or they would be put into jail. They soon got arrested.

Paul and Silas did not worry. They knew that God was with them everywhere. Even in jail! At night they sang songs and prayed.

The other prisoners and guards listened to their songs and prayers.

One night there was an earthquake. The chains on the prisoners fell off and all the jail doors opened.

If the prisoners escaped the guards would be in trouble. But Paul and Silas did not run away.

The guard was so pleased that they were still there.

"God is with us and we want you to know about Jesus, God's Son," they told the guard.

"Tell me about him," the guard said.

Paul explained how God sent his son to earth. "He healed and helped people, then died on a cross. Now he is alive again, just as God had promised. Just believe that Jesus Christ is God's Son. You too will become God's friend."

"I do believe that Jesus is God's Son," said the guard.

The Guard told all his family about Jesus. They all listened to Paul and Silas and they all believed in Jesus too. Like Paul and Silas, they were now God's children.

Jesus is tempted by Satan Matthew 4:1-11

As a boy, Jesus was always a good helper to His parents, Mary and Joseph, but He also knew that He must learn what God wanted Him to do. That's why He went to the temple to learn from the Bible. When Jesus grew up to be a man, He still obeyed God.

One day He went for a long walk in the desert. *What is a desert like? (discuss)* He stayed there many days. He did not take food with Him and had no one to talk to. He just wanted to be alone with God.

The bad angel, Satan, was there in the desert too. You cannot see this bad angel, but you can see the things that he does. He makes people do evil things. Satan thought that this would be a good time to make Jesus do something wrong. Satan talked to Jesus.

"Why don't you listen to me?" he said. "If you are hungry, why don't you turn these stones into bread?"

Now Jesus could easily do this, because He was God, and had power to do miracles. A miracle is when God does something to help people – something that no human could do. Jesus knew that Father God had sent Him to the earth to use His power to help others. His power was not for Himself, so He said to Satan, "No, Satan. God tells us that His word is more important than food."

Satan came to Jesus again and said, "You could do some fantastic tricks like jumping from this high point. Everyone would think how great you are if you jumped and didn't hurt yourself. The angels would hold you and stop you from being hurt."

Jesus knew that this was not what God wanted Him to do. Jesus didn't need to jump off a high place to make people think he was important. Jesus must do only the things that *God* told Him to do. God was His Heavenly Father and He must obey Him only.

"Get away from me Satan," said Jesus. "God's word says that we don't have to do anything to prove that God is powerful. He just IS." Jesus said "*no*" to Satan.

Satan came again and said, "When you are standing up high you can see the cities of the world. Satan said, "I will give you all these cities if you worship me." Jesus said 'no' again to Satan. He said:" The word of God says, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only." After a while Satan left Jesus. Sometimes Satan speaks to us as well. He doesn't speak in a loud voice. He only speaks through our thoughts. Perhaps he might make us think about being unkind to someone, or telling a lie. When we have those bad thoughts, we must say 'no' to Satan, just as Jesus did. We can say a verse that we know from the Bible.

The woman at the well John 4:4-26

Jesus was tired and thirsty. He sat down by a well and rested while his helpers went into town to buy food. They were all hungry after walking a long way.

A woman from the town of Samaria came to get water from the well and was surprised when Jesus asked someone like her, from Samaria, for a drink of water. In those days, people from Israel where Jesus lived, did not usually speak to people from Samaria.

Jesus said, "If you knew who I am, you would ask me to give you water that makes you new."

"But you don't have a bucket or rope and the well is deep," said the woman to Jesus.

"You soon get thirsty again when you drink water," said Jesus. "I am talking about God's spirit that can make you new and clean inside." Jesus knew about everything she had ever done, and He knew that she had done things that God does not like.

"Please give me this water," she said.

Jesus told her that God wants everyone, wherever they live, to know him and to love him with all their hearts.

"I know you are a man of God," she said. "God has promised to send someone one day, who will save us from our sins." Jesus said. "I am the Promised One."

The woman believed Jesus! She left her water jar by the well and ran home to tell everyone.

"Come and see God's promised Son!" she said,

"He knows everything I ever did!"

The people from Samaria believed too!

Nathanael John 1:43-50

When Jesus called the disciples to be His followers, He called them by name. The first ones He called were the four fishermen, Simon, Andrew, James and John. One day, Jesus met Philip walking down a street in Galilee. He knew that Philip would become one of His friends.

"Follow me," Jesus said to Philip. Philip had a friend called Nathanael. He told Nathanael about Jesus. "Come with me," said Philip. "I have found the special One sent by God."

Nathanael went with Philip to see Jesus. When Jesus saw Nathanael coming, He knew that Nathanael too would become one of His friends. He had never heard of Nathanael before, yet Jesus knew all about him. He even knew his name.

"How did you know me? How did you know my name?" asked Nathanael.

Jesus answered, "I saw you, Nathanael, even before Philip asked you to come and meet me. I saw you when you were sitting under the fig tree." Nathanael was surprised and said, "Jesus, you really are the Son of God!"

Jesus calls his disciples Luke 5:2-11

Jesus was walking along the water's edge by the sea of Galilee. He saw at the water's edge two boats, left there by the fishermen, who were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon. Jesus asked Simon to take the boat a little from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the people from the boat.

When Simon saw this, he fell at Jesus' knees and knew that Jesus was from God.

Nicodemus John 3:1-17

"No," said Jesus. "But you can have a new start in life, just like a little baby coming into the world has a new start. You have to decide to love God with all your heart, mind, soul and strength, and to love and follow Him forever."

We don't know whether Nicodemus changed because the Bible doesn't tell us, but we hope that he did. And everyone in the world can have a chance to make a new start in life by asking Jesus to come and be their special friend.
