## How to get my students involved in a personal response to a Bible story?

Get them to respond to questions like:

- 1. Which character in the story would remind you most of Jesus?
- 2. Which character was least like Jesus? Why?
- 3. Which character in the story is most like you? Why?
- 4. Why do you think God included this story in the Bible?
- 5. What part/s of the story shows you how to live like a Christian?
- 6. What can you learn about God from this story?
- 7. Which part of the story did you like the most?
- 8. Do any of these truths written thousands of years ago apply today? If so, which ones? How do they apply?
- 9. Are there truths in this chapter that contradict the ideas we hear in the world? If so, what are they?
- 10. Is there something in this chapter that surprised you? If so, how were you surprised?
- 11. Are there any parts of this story which remind you of other stories or passages of the Bible?
- 12. What is one part of the story that challenges you to change? How does it challenge you?
- 13. If we were the directors of a new movie and going to shoot the story in a modern setting, where would we choose locally? How would we dress the characters? What ages would they be? Can you suggest what work they might be doing? Is there a Christian song you know which could be played at the start or end that supports the story theme?
- 14. If we were to design a T shirt front, which promotes the story and the film, what would we include in the layout?
- 15. Let's summarise the most import learning point we take from the lesson in one sentence we all agree on together.
- 16. Let's look at some illustrations of the story in different editions of the Bible or from the internet. Does the artist show you the key part/s of the story? What picture/s would you like to see from the story in the Bible?

- 17. When you look at this YouTube video clip of the story think about how close it is to the Bible story. Is anything left out? Is anything new added in?
- 18. Draw a series of simple cartoon frames of the story which can be cut up and then mixed so that a classmate gets to put them in the correct order from beginning to the end.
