Examples of questions to ask. Select at least 10 questions from the following, or make up your own questions.

Childhood

1. What toys did you play with as a child? What was your favourite?
2. Did you have pets as a child? What kind and what were their names?
3. What jobs to do to help at home?
4. What was your favorite subject in school? Did you have a lot of homework?
5. Who was your favourite teacher? Why?
6. What was your home like? How was it different to today? Did you have the same household appliances as today?

Young Adult

1. What did you do when you left school?
2. Did you have children? Boys or girls?
3. What was the best thing about this part of your life?

Older Adult

1. What is your favorite hobby or activity now?
2. Do you have grandchildren? Do you see them often?
3. What is the best part about being (or not being) a grandparent?
4. What are some of the biggest changes you've seen in your lifetime?
5. What age has been the best age of your life? Why?
6. What is the most important lesson you've learned in your life?

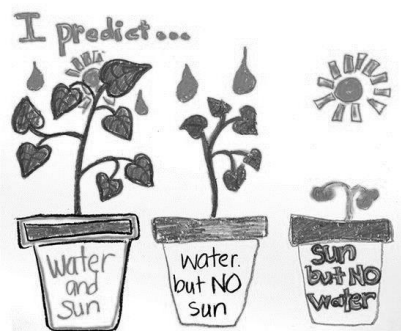
Water in 3 states of matter

- Take an ice block, let it melt. (solid to liquid)
- Boil some water in a kettle. Watch the steam come from the spout. (liquid to gas)
- Place a plate at the spout of the kettle of boiling water. See droplets form on the plate from the steam, (gas to liquid)



Plants depend on water

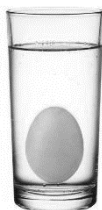
- Plant three plants in three pots.
- Place one in the dark, (e.g. in a cupboard) and give it water.
- Place one in the light but give it no water.
- Place one in the sunlight and give it water.
- What does this show us?



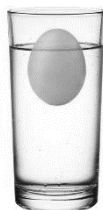
Water can make things float

Tap Water

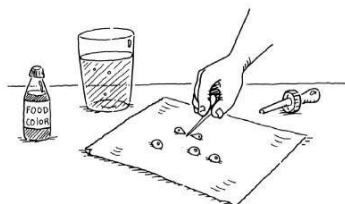


Salt Water

Water soaks into some material but not others.

Collect a range of fabrics and materials, e.g. cotton, wool, plastic, paper, glass, wood. When the water soaks in we say that the material absorbs the water.

After testing each material with water, make a chart and list the materials. Give 5 ticks for the one that absorbs the most water and 0 ticks to the one that absorbs no water (and in-between numbers for absorbing a little bit.)
