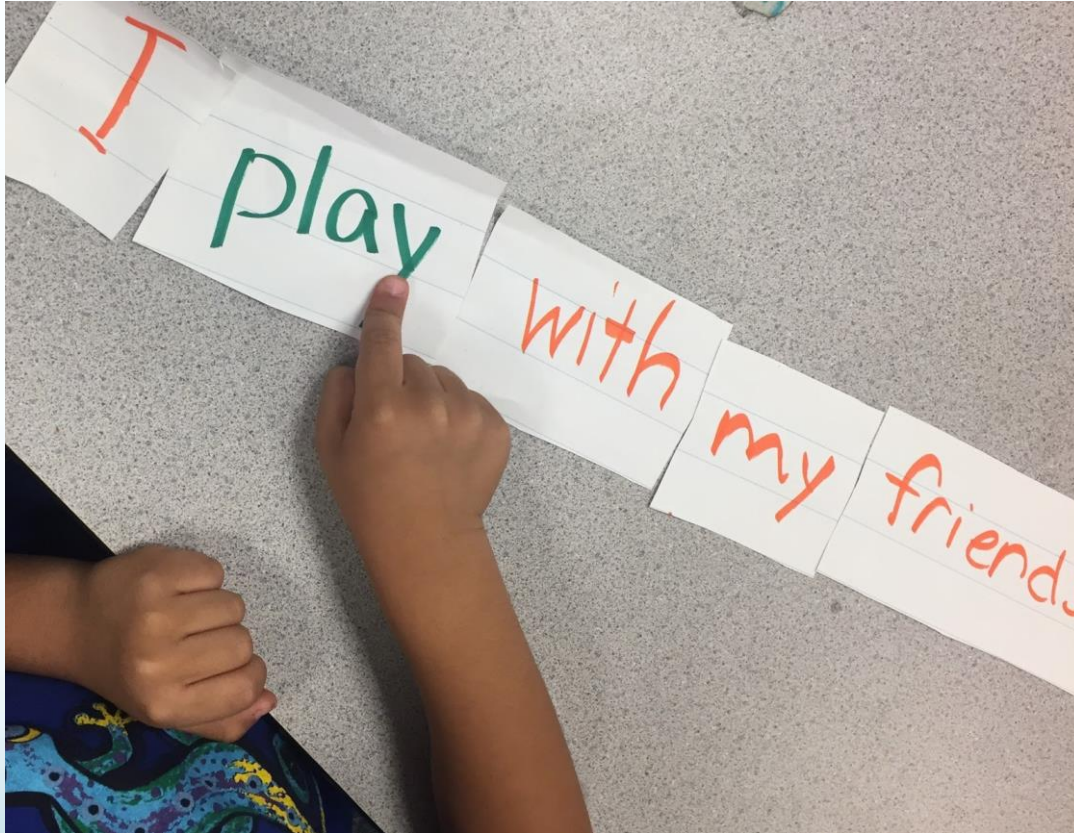
Reading on a screen: computer or mobile phone

Writing:

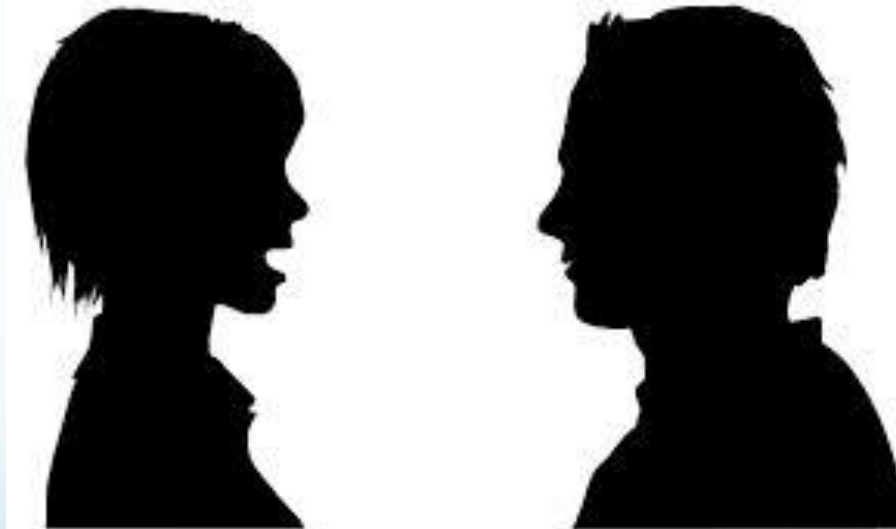
- hand writing

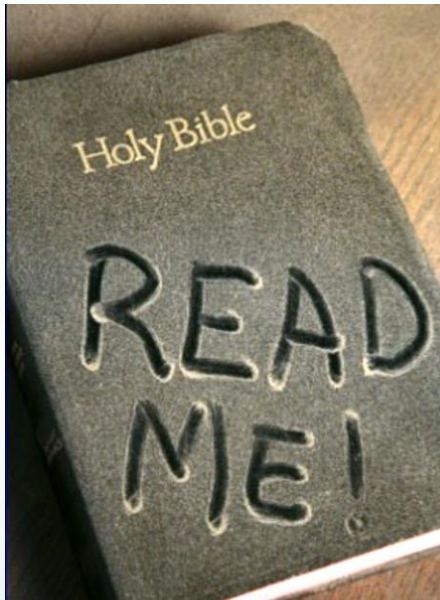

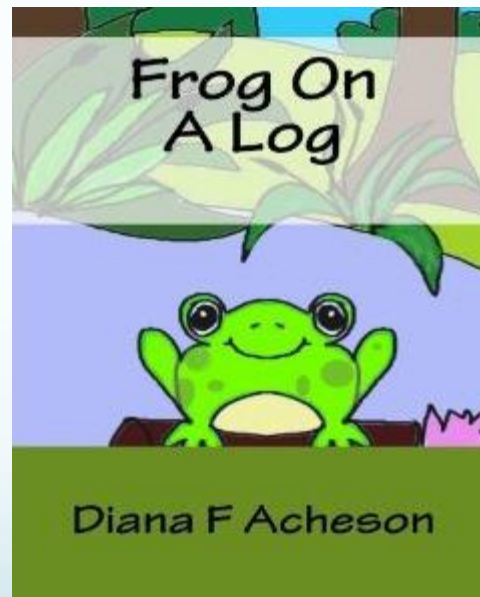

Literacy is a tool for communicating with others

- There is power in the spoken word.
- Writing is another way of communicating.
- Writing a book, an article, a blog, a Facebook message are all ways of sharing a message.

stories

Children need to hear 1000 stories before they are ready to read.





Reading story books to children

- develops a wide vocabulary through listening to others.
- develops an interest in books.
- develops the children's power of imagination.

Many people in the community have stories to tell. Involve them if you can!

Telling stories

- There are no pictures to focus on.
- It is important for the story teller to use expression in their voice
- And to use their body, hands, face and particularly their eyes.

Stories are part of culture

- Stories teach us about culture.
- There are stories from cultures all around the world that contain similar information because they originate from the beginning of civilization, (following the Great Flood), and passed on to all cultures.
- For example, stories that tell us about God as a Creator.
- And stories that tell us that once the whole earth was covered in water.
