

67. Icons and Idols

About me is a shell from Fiji, a small pyramid set from Egypt, a brass cross from Germany, a wooden Kokeshi doll from Japan, and other items like these- all of which hold memories.

The shell reminds me of the church of Fiji and the needs of Christian schools in the Pacific islands. The pyramid recalls the Coptic Christians suffering persecution. The cross speaks of the valiant small churches trying to influence Europe to turn to God, and the doll of the huge task of evangelization that faces us in Japan, which has so resisted the faith.



We have an inveterate propensity to turn objects into idols or good luck charms. Without our favourite well-handled Bible, we might feel less comfortable when ministering, but it contains the same words as the pew Bible that is accessible to us. Without our cross on a chain about our neck, we may feel less spiritually complete. And we know this to be untrue.

Yet there is something within us that is drawn to objects, and they have power to prompt us to remember spiritual principles. The Israelites were directed by God to pile up stones as a reminder, the tabernacle and later the temple contained items of significance to promote memory. The tabernacle was not just an enclosed empty space.

So long as we don't imbue the objects like a crucifix on our wall, with power and overly esteem them, they can be powerful means of ushering us forward into prayer and recall of God's faithfulness. Dr Sheila Cassidy was imprisoned and tortured by a brutal regime in Chile. She looked to the intersections in the mortar and bricks, and drew on them as her cross on the wall in her degrading and horrid circumstances. The intersections did not give her the sustaining power, any more than would a crucifix in her home, but she used them to press into the presence of God in an environment of horror.

Just as a wedding ring reminds a spouse that fidelity is required in a time of temptation, we can use items as icons to prompt us to respond in God's best way across our days. We are called to remember, (2 Tim 2:7-9) and appropriate objects can assist us in doing this and living more powerfully as a result.
