Spiritual awareness: God cares for families

God is love. He loves every family and has provided families for love, care and protection. Living in families is God's plan. Every family is special. God provides for children and protects them, through the family structure. Children feel safe in the care of their parents. A family provides food, shelter and love.

People in families belong to one another. Parents love their children very much, and children love their parents. It is God's plan for family members to show love, respect, loyalty and support for one another.

Values; Our response to 'God is Love'

- Love for God and others
- Forgiveness
- Kindness and patience with others
- Compassion: a desire to help others
- Thankfulness to God and parents for His provision
- Generosity: Sharing with others the things that God has provided
- Feeling of safety and security through being a part of a family

Outcomes: Students will

- appreciate that God has created us to belong in families
- understand the love that God our Heavenly Father has for us
- understand that problems may arise in families, and not all parents are perfect, but God is the perfect Father
- describe family members: where they were born and raised and how they are related to each other
- understand that families around the world may have different cultural traditions
- understand that there can be different types of families: large, small, single parent, extended, adopted (as in the case of orphaned children)
- describe the caring and protective roles of parents
- describe the responsibilities of children
- recognize that peace and harmony in families is achieved by living the way God wants us to live
- communicate stories of families and the past through photographs, personal belongings, books, oral histories, digital media, and museums

Activities

- Describe the family life of Jesus as a boy.
- Make a photo collection of your family.
- Draw your family.
- List members of your immediate family. List other members (extended).
- Hold a Grandparents day. Invite parents or grandparents to speak about their personal experiences.
- Create a timeline of the history of your family, from grandparents through to the youngest family member.
- Draw / discuss the things that are special to your family house, pets.
- Design a family coat of arms.
- Discuss the ways in which families celebrate special events together.
- Draw or write about a special family outing that you have enjoyed.
- Describe family members, their roles and occupations. Write about them.
- Describe the things that family members do together.
- Discuss the advantages / disadvantages of being the oldest or youngest family member.
- Discuss different types of families: large, small, single parent.
- Discuss the ways in which missionaries have provided homes for children who have been orphaned (Ps. 68:5).
- Measure and graph heights of family members.
- Make a diagram of your family table, looking from above. Use a symbol for each member.
- Look at family likeness.
- Discuss the way that God wants us to treat our family members: loving; obey parents; be helpful; express thanks; play peacefully with brothers / sisters; forgive
- Draw comparisons between the natural family and the family of God.
- Describe how your family shares in activities with other families.
- List ways in which you can help each member of your family.

- Discuss ways in which family members work together, and the value of working together.
- Discuss ways in which families can pass on skills and knowledge from generation to generation.
- Discuss the issue of adoption, and realise that some children are adopted into new families.
- Take a survey of family pets and discuss the importance of pets to the family.
- Compare family life in different cultures
- Compare family life today with family life 100 years ago. List the similarities and differences in the types of activities families do together.

Mathematics

- Measure heights of family members and graph results.
- Compare measurements of hand spans, arm lengths and head circumferences.
- Devise problem solving activities involving how many years ago family events took place.
- Devise problem solving activities involving how many years in the future a family event takes place. Eg. If my sister gets married 11 years from now she will be ? years old.
- Work out exact differences in ages between family members
- Take surveys and make graphs, e.g. type of pets owned by families; occupations of parents; number of family members.

Assessment

- 1. Make a book about your family. Take a page for each family member and draw/write about the things that are special to that family member. Those with small families can include Grandparents.
- 2. How has learning about families also taught me about God and the Bible?

Loyalty

Loyalty is ...

- not choosing the opposite side
- sticking with someone through difficult times
- caring about people
- doing what you say you will do
- commitment
- helping the people closest to you, like your family and friends

Activities:

Biography

Benjamin



The year was 1838. John Hunt, who lived in England, had something big to do for God.

"I know that God has called me go to Fiji," said John to his wife Hannah. "Will you come with me?"

"It is such a long way from England," said Hannah, "and the journey by ship will be dangerous. But God will be with us. I know that the Bible tells us to go into every part of the world to tell others about Jesus."

So John and Hannah sailed from England to Fiji.

They went to live on the island of Viwa, in the Yasawa group of islands. It was the time of cannibals. John and Hannah told people about Jesus and helped the Fijians see that killing people was wrong. Many people became Christians, and John and Hannah made good friends with the people of Viwa.

One day John and his friends were traveling in a canoe along the coast of a large island. They were going to visit a Christian village that was three days' journey around the coast. It was late afternoon so they were looking for a good place to land and shelter for the night.

Pointing to some houses near the shore, John called to his friends, "Something tells me we should go to that little village over there,"

The men looked at each other, then at John.

"But you know the people living along that part of the coast are enemies of Viwa," one of the men said. "It isn't safe for us to land there."

"Yes, I know that," he replied, "but I believe God told me that we should go to that village, so we must believe He will protect us and guide us."

They brought the canoe into shore a little distance from the village and there they found a young boy who was quite sick with leprosy. The Fijians from Viwa spoke with the boy and made friends with him.

"Please take us to your village leader," they said.

Off they went with the boy to meet the village leader.

"May we stay the night on your shore," they asked the village leader. "We have a three-day journey ahead of us and we need shelter for the night."

Then he added, "As we came here we met the young boy who has leprosy. He is very sick, but we could help him. There are medicines we have at Viwa that could help him, if you would allow us to take him back with us."

The villagers talked among themselves for a few minutes, then their leader said, "Alright, we will allow you to stay on our shore for the night if you will take the sick boy to your island and make him better."

Now John and his friends knew they were safe, because of the agreement to help the young boy.

When John and his friends brought the sick boy back to Viwa he was given medicine and his sores were cared for. The boy also heard the true stories about God the Creator and His Son, Jesus.

"Please," he said to John Hunt one day, "I want to have a Christian name because I believe in Jesus Christ."

"What name would you like to have?" John Hunt asked him.

"I'd like to be Benjamin," replied the boy. So Benjamin was now his name.

One day the men on Viwa looked out to sea and noticed a war canoe approaching their island.

"I wonder who they are," said John, "I hope they are coming in peace, not war."

When the men in the canoe landed they were surprised and pleased to meet a chief of another island and some of his men.

"I have heard that you have good news for our people," said the chief to John. "I want my people to hear this good news. Would you send a teacher back with us to teach us your good news?"

"I'm sorry," replied John, "but we have no teachers on the island with us at present. The men we have trained are all out in the villages teaching now. There are none here ready to go with you."

The visiting chief noticed Benjamin nearby and turned to speak briefly with him. Benjamin had noticed the look of disappointment on his face when John told him there were no teachers available.

Suddenly Benjamin had an idea. He turned to John eagerly.

"Please would you let me go with these men?" he begged. "I only know a little, but I could tell them what I know about God until you have other teachers ready to send."

John looked at the boy. He could see that the leprosy was not better, but he could also see that Benjamin really wanted to help.

"Alright," said John.

So the next day they sent Benjamin with the visitors in the big war canoe. It was a three-day trip but Benjamin wasted no time. As the canoe cut through the water, he told the chief all he could remember of the stories of Jesus and God the Creator. But Benjamin was growing weaker all the time, and as they came in sight of their harbour, he died.

But the chief had taken Benjamin's stories to heart and greatly desired to follow the Christian way.

"I want you to build a place where we can worship God," he announced to his people. "Then I'll tell you the stories our friend Benjamin told me about Jesus and His work. One day John Hunt will send us teachers to tell us more, but we can begin with all Benjamin told us."

And that is the story of how the Christian message came to Nadroga, Fiji.

More about John Hunt

John and Hannah stayed for 10 years in Fiji, from 1838 – 1848.

John worked on the translation of the Bible into Fijian, and finished it in 1847.

John and Hannah had two daughters, Eliza Jane and Hannah. Three other children died of dysentery soon after birth.


John died of dysentery in 1848.

Lesson content



Respect

Here are some important things that every family should have.

Respect means treating people as if they are important. It means taking notice of the things they say. Another word for *respect* is *honour*. Respect is listening to what God has to say about the way family members treat one another. God has written some rules for families. Here they are:

- Honour you father and your mother. (Exodus 20)
 This is one of the 10 commandments. It means that children must listen to what their parents tell them, and obey cheerfully. It also means to be helpful to our parents.
- Children, obey your parents, for this is right.
- Sons, listen to your father's instructions. (Proverbs)
- Be faithful to your husband or wife.

This one is for parents. It is also one of the 10 commandments.

• Love one another. 1 John 7:9


This one is for everyone!

Loyalty

Loyalty means 'not choosing the opposite side'. Another word for *loyalty* is *faithfulness*. Faithfulness is one of the fruits of the Spirit.
